Roofs Over Our Families (ROOF) has been the Local Housing Options Team (LHOT) for Somerset County for over five years. This innovative group of individuals consists of housing and supportive service providers, across Somerset County. ROOF was established as a network coalition in 2007 to address the local housing needs in our county through collaborative housing projects, planned activities, and educating community members.

As housing needs across our county increase, cross-sector collaboration is a necessary component to effectively assessing the needs of our community and to establish a strong Continuum of Care. ROOF has been on the forefront of promoting cross-sector collaboration amongst key stakeholders and improving access to safe, affordable, and accessible housing in our area.

Rural homelessness is a growing problem within Somerset County. Many individuals assume we do not have a homeless problem in our area because the homeless are not visible. The homeless within Somerset County can be found couch surfing, hiding in the woods, staying in overcrowded homes with family members, sleeping in tents, constructing make-shift units, sleeping in their cars, spending a few nights at different friend's homes, and constantly at-risk of losing their housing stability. An estimated 7% of the homeless population resides in rural areas (National Alliance to End Homelessness, 2012). The rural homeless population can be challenged with a multitude of barriers including the lack of access to transportation, affordable and safe housing, and employment opportunities.

ROOF has been a catalyst for promoting change by educating the community on the growing and diverse needs of our homeless population. In addition, this comprehensive group of partners has been identifying specific housing needs for Somerset County, establishing innovative strategies and solutions to ending homelessness in our area, and promoting a strong collaboration amongst community partners. ROOF, has been organizing and developing creative programs and events to break down barriers for those homeless in our community. A few examples include the Prepared Renter's Educational Program (PREP), 2010 Housing Fair, Annual Landlord Meetings, 2012 Human Services Fair, Sheltered/Unsheltered Point in Time Count, Annual National Hunger & Homelessness Awareness Week, ongoing speaking engagements for homeless panels, and much more. ROOF continues to be on the forefront of the housing needs within our community and hopes to be a vital part of ending homelessness in Somerset County in the near future. # Substance Abuse, Mental Illness and Homelessness

A common stereotype of the homeless population is that they are all alcoholics or drug abusers. The truth is that a high percentage of homeless people do struggle with substance abuse and mental health issues, but these conditions should be viewed as illnesses and require a great deal of treatment, counseling, and support to overcome. Substance abuse is both a cause and a result of homelessness, often arising after people lose their housing.

Beal Counseling & Consulting (BCC) has partnered with CAPFSC/Tableland Services Inc to provide an integrated

approach in helping those who are homeless with substance abuse and/or mental health issues. BCC is the areas only facility licensed to provide both outpatient Drug and Alcohol and Mental Health treatment. BCC believes in treating the whole person and collaborates with CAPFSC and other service providers to insure that those in need are linked with the resources that are available in the area.

Substance abuse is often a cause of homelessness. Addictive disorders disrupt relationships with family and friends and often cause people to lose their jobs. For people who are already struggling to pay their bills, the onset or exacerbation of an addiction may cause them to lose their housing. A 2008 survey by the United States Conference of Mayors asked 25 cities for their top three causes of homelessness. Substance abuse was the single largest cause of homelessness for single adults (reported by 68% of cities). Substance abuse was also mentioned by 12% of cities as one of the top three causes of homelessness for families. According to Didenko and Pankratz (2007), two-thirds of homeless people report that drugs and/or alcohol were a major reason for their becoming homeless.

In many situations, however, substance abuse is a result of homelessness rather than a cause. People who are homeless often turn to drugs and alcohol to cope with their situations. They use substances in an attempt to attain temporary relief from their problems. In reality, however, substance dependence only exacerbates their problems and decreases their ability to achieve employment stability and get off the streets. Additionally, some people may view drug and alcohol use as necessary to be accepted among the homeless community (Didenko and Pankratz, 2007).

For many homeless people, substance abuse co-occurs with mental illness. Often, people with untreated mental illnesses use street drugs as an inappropriate form of self-medication. Homeless people with both substance disorders and mental illness experience additional obstacles to recovery, such as increased risk for violence and victimization and frequent cycling between the streets, jails, and emergency rooms. Sadly, these people are often unable to find treatment facilities that will help them. accept people with substance abuse disorders, and many programs for homeless substance abusers do not treat people with mental illnesses. Breaking an addiction is difficult for anyone, especially for substance abusers who are homeless.

To begin with, motivation to stop using substances may be poor. For many homeless people, survival is more important than personal growth and development, and finding food and shelter take a higher priority than drug counseling. Many homeless people have also become estranged from their families and friends. Without a social support network, recovering from a substance addiction is very difficult. Even if they do break their addictions, homeless people may have difficulty remaining sober while living on the streets where substances are so widely used (Fisher and Roget, 2009). Unfortunately, many treatment programs focus on abstinence only programming, which is less effective than harm-reduction strategies and does not address the

# Tapestry of Health

A tapestry is a fabric with colorful woven threads that create an overall design ("tapestry"). Due to the word, "tapestry," used in its name, the Somerset Tapestry of Health might make some think of sewing. When really analyzed, that might not be too far off-course. While the staff members at the Tapestry are certainly not seamstresses, the diverse populations they serve are all woven together by one main strand: poverty.

The Somerset Tapestry of Health is a non-profit organization that provides several programs to help families in need. The WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) program serves pregnant women and families with children under the age of five. The program provides nutrition education, health screenings, and healthy groceries for eligible families.

Additionally, WIC provides breastfeeding support to new mothers. Breast pumps are available as well as a Lactation Consultant and Breastfeeding Peer Counselor who provide support and answers for participants. In addition to breastfeeding support, the Happy Baby Initiative program provides a DVD training to WIC parents to help calm fussy babies.

Throughout the summer months, WIC participants are also able to buy fresh, locally-grown produce through the Farmers' Market Nutrition Program. In fact, all foods provided by the WIC program are designed to be healthy and nutritious for families.

If transportation is an issue, the WIC staff is able to provide services at off-site locations after the initial appointment is conducted at the Somerset office. These locations include the following areas: Confluence, Jennerstown, Davidsville, Meyersdale, and Windber. Another nutrition program that the Tapestry assists in providing is the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Formerly known as the Food Stamp program, SNAP serves people of all ages. #### PA 2-1-1 Central Region is Live

2-1-1 is an easy to remember three-digit telephone number, designated by the Federal Communications Commission, that provides assistance to consumers who are looking for human service providers in their communities. From the single parent needing food for her children to the senior trying to locate in-home care, Information and Referral brings community members and community resources together.

2-1-1 is now available in the Central Region of Pennsylvania which includes: Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Centre, Clinton, Columbia, Fulton, Huntingdon, Juniata, Lycoming, Mifflin, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, Somerset, and Union counties.

By dialing 2-1-1, residents access a live Information and Referral (I&R) Specialist who provides contact information specific to the caller's local community. Community Help Centre, located in State College, is the Regional Call Center. CONTACT Altoona (Blair County), Linkage Lycoming (Lycoming County) and Union-Snyder Community Action Agency (Snyder County) also provide PA 2-1-1 services to this sixteen county region.

The PA 2-1-1 network would like to advise businesses that have internal extensions and do not dial an access digit for an outside line, that 2-1-1 may not work on their phone system unless the phone system is reprogrammed. Reprogramming is usually as easy as getting in touch with the company that made or supports the businesses' phone system and asking them for instructions to program the phone so that the 2-1-1 call can be completed.

As a broad partnership of United Way agencies, Information and Referral providers, local government and other philanthropic organizations, PA 2-1-1 plays an important role in effectively coordinating information about services, and provides a single telephone number individuals can call when they are seeking information about assistance.

The long-term goal of the network is to reduce costs to private and governmental human support services by moving those in need into service support prior to the development of full-blown and costly crisis situations.

The result is a regional, technologically advanced system capable of:

- sharing data among local providers
- ✤ rolling calls to other agencies in times of natural disaster

meeting current licensing standards for information and referral providers across the country

"We greatly appreciate and extend our sincere thanks to the hard work and dedication of the many volunteers in the PA 2-1-1 Central Region, and those who contributed with the needed start-up funding to make this 2-1-1 system a reality in Cambria and Somerset Counties, including Community Foundation for the Alleghenies, Cambria County Alliance, Lee Initiatives, and the United Way of the Laurel Highlands," said Bill McKinney, President, of the United Way of the Laurel Highlands.

Al Jones, Executive Director of the Centre Foundation, a key funding partner via a matching grant from the John S and James L Knight Foundation, lauded the hard work that has gone into securing and creating the data platform that will assure people are connected to services, "Moving people into programs that support their needs will reduce costs by preventing problems from growing into crisis."

The PA 2-1-1 system is built around seven interconnected regional service systems utilizing established guidelines to ensure consistent, high quality service for everyone in the state. The result is a service that is available by telephone and on-line database, 24 hours daily, every day of the year. As the PA 2-1-1 system expands throughout the Commonwealth it will have the capacity to partner with 9-1-1 in times of natural or manmade disaster so that 9-1-1 can dedicate itself to First Responders, leaving 2-1-1 to provide answers to urgent, but not emergency calls.

Come join ROOF (Roofs Over Our Families) as we bring awareness of poverty in Somerset County with the Community Action Poverty Simulation (CAPS). **This simulation is NOT a game.** It is designed to help participants begin to understand what it might be like to live in a typical low-income family trying to survive from month to month. The object is to sensitize participants to the realities faced by low-income people.

This experience will last for 2 1/2—3 hours. It includes an introduction and briefing, the actual simulation exercise, and a debriefing period in which participants and volunteer staffers share their feelings and experiences and talk about what they have learned about the lives of people in poverty.

# Southwestern PA Food Security Partnership

With rising grocery costs and gas prices higher than they have been in years it is easy to believe that many Americans are beginning to struggle. For some, they are having an even harder time keeping their heads above water. In a small town comprised of even smaller outlying areas it is easy to not be aware of just how bad some peoples situations are. Somerset County is certainly no exception to the rule. Out of 379 households recently surveyed, 27.4% have an annual income of \$10,000-\$15,000. One can imagine that for a single person that income would make it difficult to secure even just the necessities in a given year..

There are undoubtedly many households in similar situations in our County; which bill do we not pay this month? What store has the cheapest grocery prices? Do we have the gas to get there? Can we afford my prescription this month? Families are making choices between food, bills, and prescriptions, making for a stressful situation no matter who you are. It is no longer an issue of the non working population, or those collecting benefits. These are issues affecting our neighbors with college educations, our elderly parents, the hardworking man now on disability. The issue of hunger is everywhere.

What are these households supposed to do? Where can they go for help? As hunger is in our own backyard, conveniently so are some of the answers. Certain programs helping people to afford food and feed their families have been around a long time, others are up in coming. In addition to federally funded programming, the people of Somerset County have come together for the good of the cause and are working together to help their neighbors.

A prime example of new things coming is the launch of the Somerset County Mobile Food Bank, which will be making its debut on September 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> taking food to all of the areas surrounding Somerset County (details available upon request). The Somerset Tapestry of Health offers SNAP application assistance and has a staff person that will complete the application with interested individuals right on site. The Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank has introduced Produce to People to our County, which has been a HUGE success. Distributing upwards to 25,000lbs each month and serving over 500 of our local families.

There is a large gap between the number of eligible participants and those actually utilizing the programs available. Some examples of this are; an estimated 11,806 people are eligible to receive SNAP benefits but are not in Somerset County. 83% of those eligible for the Farmer's Market Nutrition Program are not receiving. An estimated 1,164 residents are eligible to receive WIC for themselves and or their children and are not. WIC now will only check income annually rather than on a 6 month basis to make it easier on participants.

Many of the federally funded programs available are not being used by those who are eligible and need it, especially now more than ever. Education and awareness of available resources is crucial, especially when concerning hunger. These programs are designed to help those in need. As programs go unused, they are at risk for a decrease in funding with the potential to be cut entirely.
